

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INTERNAL ORGANIZATION

To help organize equipment for events and trail days, we purchased a trailer for the ARCC. This trailer helps keep our tools, banners, tents, etc., all in one place and easily accessible for all events. Our trailer allows the ARCC to fundraise by selling ad space on each side to our many sponsors. Internally for the ARCC, we focused on the efficiency of communication, financials, and documentation. Being an all-volunteer nonprofit organization, we pushed ourselves to the edge of what we could physically and mentally organize in 2022.

We kicked the year off with the 1st annual Arkansas Climbers Festival at Horseshoe Canyon Ranch. This event was a huge success mainly due to the response from the community, with their willingness to learn new skills, fellowship, and support one another. Over 160 participants, 60 hosts, and 12 vendors came out for a fantastic festival. The weather gods were on our side and provided some splinter Arkansas Spring weather. Behind the scenes, we were fortunate laying the groundwork for such an event through our many years of much smaller events and communication skills. Even with the success of the climber's festival, we still had much to learn, including task delegation and organization. This led us to test and eventually deploy Discord for our board members to help organize communications for events, finances, committees, etc. [...continued]

[...continued] We added a couple more members to the team in 2022. First, we welcomed Jane Lacson to the board in October 2022. Jane was one of the first ARCC Ambassadors and had been helping with events and our beautiful website, and she has been intently active with many events and projects since joining the board.

We also welcomed Amber Marler to help us with social media. Regular content posting and community engagement are a ton of work. Amber has graciously agreed to help post on social media for the ARCC, which allows all the board members to breathe a little easier, and, more importantly, helps us connect with the public better.

Another area we wanted to focus on last year was to develop a guideline for Development Standards and ethics for Arkansas. As we continue to see more and more new routes, the community of climbers in Arkansas must all agree on the best practices for development, including hardware, spacing, anchors, and altering rock.

01 — Local Climber Organizations (LCO's)

In January 2022, the American Safe Climbing Association (ASCA) donated a substantial amount of hardware to the ARCC (30 sets of mussy hooks, 150 wave bolts, two bolt pullers, 150 1/2" x4.75" Powers SS 5-piece bolts, hole blowers, 25 drill bits, ten-hole brushes, and hole patch). This hardware replaced old and worn-out gear across the state. The ASCA is an incredible organization to donate to - please check them out!

The Access Fund is the backbone for climbing across the country. We continue to work with this great organization on many projects - including a full day working in the mud at Invasion in Cowell, Arkansas. We learned how to make a french drain to help a natural spring flow properly from under the cliff and mitigate erosion from foot traffic.

While in town, the Access Fund Conservation Team, Stark Ligon, Andrew Childs, and Walker Bedell met with the Arkansas Natural Heritage Commission (ANHC) at Dardanelle Rock (aka D Rock). This meeting allowed them to discuss a significant erosion control, hillside stability, and slope rehab project at the base of the D Rock to create new trails and climbing platforms. [...]

[...] D Rock will be a substantial project regarding financial and volunteer resources required to complete this project. We are still in the planning stages, and we hope to hear from the ANHC soon regarding plans moving forward. The Access Fund is a major supporter of all LCOs, including the ARCC, and we are excited to see our partnership grow in 2023.

It's worth mentioning that the ARCC works with several LCOs nationwide. We are always eager to join the Access Fund Central Time Zone LCO Meetup. During these meetings, we learn a lot from other LCOs regarding their successes and failures. For example, the Oklahoma Climbers Coalition suggested we try Discord during one of these meetings. We tried this out and made the switch for our ARCC Board meetings.

We are very grateful for their recommendation. In the past, we have been in contact with the Illinois Climbers Association for event advice, Black Hills Climbers Coalition for ideas on a website platform, and the Southeastern Climbers Coalition for information on development standards, administration structuring, and land acquisition. Working with other LCOs has opened the door to many great collaborations and ideas.



02 — Land Managers

The Forest Service continues to welcome climbers in all four of their districts across Arkansas and continues to be receptive to ideas and projects we present. In early 2022, we sat down with the Boston Mountain Ranger District (BMRD) to discuss a rebolt at Fern and issues of unauthorized trails and bat habitats in their district. This was a productive meeting, and the ARCC devised a structured plan to preserve and maintain climbing areas across their district. We are currently working on a climbing route audit and trail survey for Fern to add to the Climbing Management Plan proposal per the request of the BMRD Chief Ranger. This project will help protect this district's climbing and strengthen the relationship between climbers and the USFS.

In 2022, we worked with the Big Piney Ranger District (BPRD) on several projects, including a trail day at Invasion, paying for pit toilets at Sam's Throne, a rebolt/rail day at Sams, and moving forward with a plan for permanent locations for the Wag Bag Project. At the rebolt/trail day, our trail crew removed three giant fallen trees around Sam's Throne and cleared the trail network of leaves using leaf blowers. In addition, the route crews replaced 118 old bolts (71 anchor bolts and 47 bolts on routes). All bolts replaced used stainless steel ClimbTech wave bolts or SS" x 4.7" Powers 5-piece. It was a massive effort by 23 volunteers over two days, and we appreciate having a forest service administration that loves climbers!

The holes from old hardware were cleaned out and reused whenever possible to minimize impact. In addition, the trail crew removed large trees on all the main trails, did some erosion control around the Throne proper, and redefined the trail to the Patio Boulders and around most of Sam's with the leaf blower.




How Money Was Raised:

The ARCC board was hard at work towards the end of 2021 and leading into 2022, pursuing grant options for funding climbing, outreach, and development projects. This momentum, coupled with the 1st Annual Arkansas Climbers Festival, Northwest Arkansas events, and Little Rock events, turned 2022 into an incredible year for grants and funding. In addition, for the third year in a row, ARCC membership was over 100 annual members, with 115 members signing up - Thank You! Membership is a small yet vital component of the ARCC's revenue, and the summation of all these components allowed the ARCC to raise \$36,838.72 in 2022 - no small feat.




We Raised \$ 36,838.72 in 2022!
